results based on unsubstantiated claims of a “stolen” election is not sustainable in a democracy, and it discredits the political party making those charges. We hope that setting out the full record in this Report will help restore faith in the reliability of our elections.

As part of his post-election attempts to retain the presidency, Donald Trump and his supporters filed 64 cases containing 187 counts in the six key battleground states, in addition to utilizing some of the recount and contest procedures available to them under state law. The former president maintains to this day that the 2020 election was stolen and the results fraudulent.

Every member of this informal group has worked in Republican politics, been appointed to office by Republicans, or is otherwise associated with the Party. None have shifted loyalties to the Democratic Party, and none bear any ill will toward Trump and especially not toward his sincere supporters.

Many of them have worked over the years in polling places as part of Republican Election Day Operations looking for the same sort of fraud and irregularities Donald Trump claimed in 2020. Such vigilance is entirely appropriate and must not be stigmatized as “voter suppression.”

Fraud, irregularities, and procedural deficiencies formed the basis for challenging the results in five of the six highly contested Electoral College battleground states of Arizona, Georgia, Michigan, Nevada, and Wisconsin. In Pennsylvania, Trump verbally attacked the elections as fraudulent, but his lawyers never filed such charges in court.

For this Report, they examined every count of every case brought in these six battleground states. They include both a narrative for each state and an accompanying Addendum listing each case and its disposition.

They conclude that Donald Trump and his supporters had their day in court and failed to produce substantive evidence to

make their case.

Of the 64 cases brought by Trump and his supporters, twenty were dismissed before a hearing on the merits, fourteen were voluntarily dismissed by Trump and his supporters before a hearing on the merits, and 30 cases included a hearing on the merits. Only in one Pennsylvania case involving far too few votes to overturn the results did Trump and his supporters prevail.

Repetition of these false charges causes real harm to the basic foundations of the country, with 30 percent of the population lacking faith in the results of our elections.

The group determined that in our system of government, these cases provided the forums in which Trump and his supporters could and should have proven their claims. This Report shows that those efforts failed because of a lack of evidence and not because of erroneous rulings or unfair judges. Judges, legislators, and other election officers, often in-

Con Edison Mobilized For Extended Heat Wave

Company Reminds Customers to Save by Using Energy Wisely

Con Edison is mobilizing to respond to any service problems that occur as temperatures rise into the 90s for a second consecutive week.

This week's run of temperatures above 90 degrees could last through the weekend.

The company reminds customers that they can lower their bills by using energy wisely and urges them to take a look at Con Edison's energy efficiency programs.

Heat, humidity and increased demand for electricity to power air conditioners can cause cables to overheat and lead to outages. The coming days could also bring thunderstorms, which can affect the overhead delivery system and cause outages.

The company urges members of the public to stay away from any wires that are downed during storms. Those wires may be live. Do not try to touch or move them with your hands or any object. Call your local police department or 1-800-75-CONED (1-800-752-6633) to report downed wires.

Con Edison may assign workers to guard downed wires and keep people and pets away from them. These workers may be in unmarked vehicles but they carry Con Edison identification.

How to Report an Outage - Con Edison will send text messages to customers in areas expected to be most impacted, reminding them to be prepared and to report an outage by simply replying OUT to the text. Customers can sign up for text alerts at coned.com/text.

Customers can also report outages and check service restoration status at conEd.com/reportoutage, with Con Edison's mobile app for iOS or Android devices, or by calling 1-800-75-CONED (1-800-752-6633).

The company also sends e-mails to customers to communicate energy-saving tips and information on reporting outages.

Customers who report out-

ages will receive updates from Con Edison with their estimated restoration times as they become available. Information on outages and restoration times is also available at the Con Edison outage map. Watch an outage map tutorial video here.

Energy-Saving Tips - New Yorkers can stay cool and save all summer by following these money-saving conservation tips:

- If you are running your air conditioner, close off unoccupied rooms. If you are using the AC in your living room and nobody is in the bedrooms, close the doors to those rooms;
- Set your air conditioner to the highest comfortable temperature. Every degree you lower the thermostat increases costs;
- To reduce heat and moisture in your home, run appliances such as ovens, washing machines, dryers and dishwashers in the early morning or late at night when it's cooler outside;
- When the AC is running, close doors to keep cool air in and hot air out;
- Keep shades, blinds and curtains closed. About 40 percent of unwanted heat comes through windows;
- Even when using AC, use ceiling and other fans to provide additional cooling and better circulation;
- Turn off AC units, lights and other appliances when not at home and use a timer to turn on your air conditioner about a half-hour before arriving home;
- If you run a business, keep the door closed while running the AC;
- Keep AC filters clean.

Replacing an old air conditioner with a new ENERGY STAR unit can reduce energy usage by 30 percent.

Con Edison offers additional energy savings tips.

Energy Efficiency Programs - The company also urges customers to look into its energy efficiency programs. Customers can get incentives for making

energy-saving upgrades to their lighting, HVAC and other equipment.

For this summer, Con Edison is offering residential customers a \$50 discount for buying an eligible smart thermostat and another \$85 for registering it with Con Edison's Bring Your Own Thermostat (BYOT) Program. Con Edison is also offering residential customers a \$1,000 rebate to weatherize their home with new air sealing and proper insulation.

Con Edison is offering incentives for commercial and industrial customers. They include cash incentives for installing high-efficiency, ultra-low temperature freezers, lighting incentives, and instant rebates for new natural gas and electric food service equipment.

Small and medium-size businesses can get a free, no-obligation energy assessment of their facility. Con Edison will pay about 50 percent of the cost for qualified lighting, HVAC, refrigeration and gas upgrades. Con Edison is also offering financing with rates as low as zero percent and no money down for eligible energy-efficiency upgrades.

Owners of multi-family buildings can also get energy efficiency incentives. Those include:

- Rebates for installing energy efficient gas and electric equipment in Affordable and Market Rate buildings;

cluding members of his own party, gave Trump ample time and every opportunity to present evidence to make his case. Post-election audits or reviews in each state also failed to show any irregularities or fraud that would overturn the electoral results. In many cases, after making extravagant claims of wrongdoing, Trump's legal representatives showed up in court or state proceedings empty-handed, and then returned to their rallies and media campaigns to repeat the same unsupported claims.

Even now, twenty months after the election, a period in which Trump's supporters have been energetically scouring every nook and cranny for proof that the election was stolen, they come up empty. Claims are made, trumpeted in sympathetic media, and accepted as truthful by many patriotic Americans. But on objective examination they have fallen short, every time.

Moreover, even if there were such evidence (which we did not find), there is an obligation on the part of a campaign challenging the veracity of official results to bring its challenges on a timely basis, through the established legal channels, based on ordinary rules of evidence and logic. In our system of government, these proceedings provide the forums in which Mr. Trump and his supporters could and should have proven their claims. They had every opportunity to use those channels. Once they had lost, Trump and his supporters had an obligation

to recognize that the election debate was over. Questions of election legality must be resolved dispassionately in courts of law, not through rallies and demonstrations—and most emphatically, not by applying political pressure and threats to induce Congress to ignore its constitutional duty and the electoral outcome for which the people voted, and which the legal processes of the affected states had examined and confirmed. The same system used to bring all his cases, recounts, and contests also sets deadlines for when the process becomes final, a winner is declared, and the losing candidate concedes. Trump failed to abide by that norm in contrast to prior losers of presidential elections such as Richard Nixon and Al Gore.

After reviewing the evidence presented in each court case and the post-election reviews with this lens, certain patterns emerge. Most obvious is that the former president's rhetoric—before, during and after the election—was not supported by the legal cases he tried to make or any evidence he introduced. Cases and reviews in the six battleground states included similar charges and similar dismissals by federal and state courts. Governor Hochul Signs Assemblymember Jessica González-Rojas and State Senator Samra Brouk's Bill to Study The Disparate Impacts of Postpartum Depression Screenings Into Law

Governor Hochul signed legislation by Assemblymember Jessica González-Rojas and State Senator Samra Brouk aimed at improving the maternal health of communities of color into law. The law requires the office of mental health and the department of health to conduct a study on the disparate impacts of postpartum depression screening tests. Assemblymember González-Rojas, the primary sponsor of A9102, introduced the bill to address the under-diagnosis and under-treatment in vulnerable, at-risk populations, particularly Black and Brown women. This legislation is supported by the Mental Health Association in New York State and National Alliance on Mental Illness - New York State.

Postpartum mood and anxiety disorders are the most common complications in the postpartum period, affecting one in five women. The risks are significantly higher for new mothers of color; notably, while Black women are twice as likely to experience many of these conditions, they

are half as likely to seek help. Maternal mental health conditions such as anxiety disorders, obsessive-compulsive disorder, post-traumatic stress disorder, bipolar illness, and substance use disorders, can create bonding issues between a birthing parent and baby, contribute to sleep and feeding problems, and cause mental, emotional, developmental, and verbal complications in children. A large 2020 study published in the Archives of Women's Mental Health found that women of color, including African-American, Asian-American, Native American, multiracial, and other non-white individuals, are less likely to be screened for depression, compared with white women, during the postpartum period. As a result, nearly 60 percent of Black and Latina mothers do not receive any treatment or support services for prenatal and postpartum emotional complications. Furthermore, postpartum depression is 40 percent greater in Latina mothers

AG James Demands National Gun Distributors Immediately Stop Selling & Bringing Illegal Ghost Gun Parts Into New York

Following Lawsuit Against Gun Distributors, AG James Files Motion for Preliminary Injunction Against Companies That Sold and Delivered Illegal Ghost Gun Parts to Undercover Investigators in New York

New York Attorney General Letitia James took action to stop national gun distributors from selling and bringing illegal ghost gun parts into New York. Following her landmark lawsuit against these distributors, Attorney General James filed a motion for a preliminary injunction against six of those gun distributors that sold and shipped unfinished frames and receivers to undercover investigators in New York. An investigation by the Office of the Attorney General (OAG) found that these businesses sent thousands of similar unfinished frames and receivers to individuals in New York who later committed violent crimes.

“Every single day people across the country are losing their lives to gun violence,” said Attorney General James. “We cannot and will not allow our children and our communities to continue to live in fear that their school, parade, or grocery store will be next. Today, we are taking serious action to immediately stop these companies from illegally selling and bringing these dangerous ghost gun parts into New York. We will continue to fight to protect New Yorkers and bring justice to communities devastated by gun violence.”

Attorney General James is seeking a preliminary injunction

against six of the gun distributors that her office sued. These six gun distributors were caught red-handed when they sold and shipped nine unfinished frames to undercover investigators in New York. They include Brownells, Inc. (Brownells), Rock Slide USA, LLC (Rock Slide), Arm or Ally, LLC (Arm or Ally), Rainier Arms, LLC (Rainier Arms), Salvo Technologies, Inc. (80 P Builder or 80P Freedom Co), and Indie Guns, LLC (Indie Guns).

In the filing for a preliminary injunction, Attorney General James asserts that these businesses sell these dangerous products with the intention that their customers will convert them into working firearms, and even take steps to assist them in doing so. Rainier Arms’ web page marketing an AR-15-compatible receiver links to a PDF of milling instructions, while Brownells offers step-by-step video instructions on finishing a Glock-compatible pistol frame, and a telephone support line where customers can ask for assistance. They also sell their products inside a “jig,” a plastic structure for the product that guides the user’s tools through the simple steps required to finish the frame. In the words of 80 Percent Arms, the jigs “make it ridiculously easy for a non-machinist to finish their [handgun frame] in under 1 hour with no drill press required.” This process is designed to be a workaround to avoid federal gun serialization, recordkeeping, and background check requirements. Once turned into a working firearm, these il-

legal weapons have been used to commit crimes and harm New Yorkers.

Attorney General James is asking the court to order these businesses to immediately stop selling, shipping, distributing, or otherwise supplying unfinished frames or receivers to any person or entity with a New York address.

Last month, Attorney General James filed a landmark lawsuit against multiple gun distributors for fueling the gun violence crisis and endangering New Yorkers. The nation-leading lawsuit alleges that these businesses violated several laws, including New York’s licensing laws, by selling weapons to felons and others without a background check. Attorney General James’ lawsuit stands out by detailing how these businesses repeatedly undermined the law and flooded New York’s streets with illegal ghost guns that harmed New Yorkers.

This litigation is led by Special Counsel James Thompson and Special Counsel Monica Hanna with support from Data Scientist Kenneth Morales, Director of Research and Analytics Jonathan Werberg, and interns Nick Leiber, Gertrude Abarentos, and Harry Reis, all under the supervision of First Deputy Attorney General Jennifer Levy. The investigation was conducted by investigators Chad Shelmidine, Peter Schottenfeld, and Paul Matthews, all under the supervision of Deputy Chief Investigator Jonathan Wood and Deputy Chief Investigator Edward Carrasco.

Addition at National Korean War Veterans Memorial to be Unveiled July 27

Just in time for the 69th anniversary of the end of the Korean War, on July 27, 2022, massive renovations to the Korean War Veterans Memorial will be unveiled, featuring the addition of the Wall of Remembrance. A stunning counterpoint to the iconic mural wall and steel sculptures, it will feature the names of the fallen, including 36,000-plus U.S. soldiers, and for the first time ever, 7,000-plus KATUSA soldiers who fought alongside U.S. soldiers to defend the people of South Korea and preserve democracy.

In 1995, visionary industrial designer Louis Nelson conceived and spent five years creating the striking, original and unforgettable granite mural featuring the faces of those who served in America’s “Forgotten War.” In tandem with Frank Gaylord’s haunting steel sculptures and the addition of the Wall of Remembrance, Nelson’s wall continues to form a lasting tribute to both those who gave their lives and those who survived the brutal first salvo of the Cold War.

In honor of this monument as well as his experiences in the Korean War, Louis Nelson wrote his deeply ruminative memoir, *Mosaic: War Monument Mystery* (Original Trade Paperback; ISBN: 978-1098366124), which details not only his personal process and intentions in designing the mural, but also explores the complex web of motivations, aspirations, conflicts and controversies that accompany the building of memorials, especially those commemorating war.

“The basis of all my work,” Nelson explains, “is the purity and simplicity of design relationships working hand in hand with the story, the clear narrative to move people to understand and perhaps take action and assure their comfort in that process. At its core is that it must matter.”

Fittingly, in *Mosaic*, Nelson blends aspects of his own autobiography, recounting the journey that shaped the work he designs. Raised in the melting pot of New York City, he studied at Pratt before a stint as a U.S. Army helicopter pilot. Military life, as absorbing as it was, took its toll on his first marriage, and he left the service, narrowly escaping a probable tour of duty in Vietnam. Returning to Pratt for graduate school, he went on to an eminent career as an industrial designer.

In 1990, Nelson was asked to design the mural, and he immersed himself in the often-overlooked history of the Korean conflict. This profound engagement gave him great insight into the human reality of the war—a reality he chose to recreate and celebrate through some 2,000 faces, taken from actual photographs from the military archives. Engraved into

the granite through a constellation of points, these are images of different groups of occupations in each of the services—from truck drivers to pilots, signal men to telephone operators, boatswains to bridge builders, doctors and nurses to cooks.

Nelson places the Korean War Veterans Memorial into multiple contexts: its physical and symbolic placement on the National Mall in Washington, D.C., straddling the Lincoln Memorial and providing a balancing arm to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial; its historical lineage in the long tradition of memorials to soldiers and conflict—in America and beyond; its healing powers as a place of remembrance and reflection for those who lived the experience or loved someone who did; and illumination for those who need to be reminded of the call of duty and the sacrifices these no longer faceless service members made.

“Louis Nelson’s memorial about bringing to granite life the storied history of a memorial to a ghostly war is a memorial in itself,” says Lionel Tiger, Charles Darwin Professor Emeritus of Anthropology, Rutgers University. “It celebrates with painful candor the skill, stubbornness, and raw political talent necessary to commemorate with dignity the intricate pain and challenge of a national war.”

Speaker Adrienne Adams Testifies in Support of Civilian Complaint Review Board’s Proposed Rule Changes to Investigate Complaints of Bias-Based Policing And Self-Initiate Complaints

At a Civilian Complaint Review Board (CCRB) hearing on Wednesday, Speaker Adrienne E. Adams submitted testimony in support of proposed rule changes that would expand its ability to investigate complaints. The changes would allow CCRB to investigate complaints of racial profiling and bias-based policing, as well as self-initiate complaints. These significant changes are the result of Council legislation that was enacted, including Local Law 24 of 2022 for which Speaker Adams was the lead sponsor. In her testimony, Speaker Adams expressed her support for these changes.

The Speaker’s testimony states: “Nearly 30 years after the

CCRB was established in its current form to investigate police misconduct, the CCRB will finally have the authority to investigate complaints of bias-based policing, racial profiling and to self-initiate complaints. Local Law 47 of 2021 was passed by the Council last year after an investigation uncovered racist behavior by a deputy inspector who was second in command of the Police Department’s Equal Employment Opportunity Division. While the CCRB has historically handled complaints in categories of excessive force, abuse of authority, discourtesy, and offensive language, there was no CCRB recourse for a complainant who experienced

bias-based policing, unless offensive language was used. In those instances, the policing complaints would be directed to the NYPD’s Internal Affairs Bureau, and the offensive language would be sent for investigation to CCRB, creating a bifurcated, confusing system for complainants. Local Law 24 of 2022, which I sponsored, was passed by the Council late last year as well. This legislation provides a critical tool to the CCRB in the ongoing fight against racial profiling and bias-based policing. The CCRB no longer has to wait for someone to file a complaint—it can now undertake its own investigation based on footage that it has come across.”

Velázquez Leads 6 Members of Congress in Letter to Public Service Commission Expressing Their Concerns Regarding Con Edison

Rep. Nydia M. Velázquez (D-NY) led six Members of Congress in sending a letter to the Public Service Commission in response to Con Edison’s proposed rate hikes and their continued investments in existing fossil fuel infrastructure.

“As New Yorkers struggle to make ends meet, we encourage the Public Service Commission (PSC) to consider a close evalu-

ation of the proposed rate hikes and believe that Con Edison should prioritize more of their investments in making the transition to renewable energy,” wrote the lawmakers. “New Yorkers are already struggling to afford current utility bills as the economic impact of the pandemic lingers and our country deals with record-high inflation rates driving up the cost of food and other

necessities. These unprecedented circumstances underscore the need to keep utility rates affordable and not approve hikes, which would be the ‘steepest in at least fifteen years.’”

In addition to Velázquez, the letter was signed by Representatives: Jamaal Bowman, Adriano Espaillat, Mondaire Jones, Carolyn Maloney, Grace Meng, and Jerrold Nadler.



New York City is working with the federal government to ensure the city can provide comprehensive support and resources to these individuals. Mayor Adams released the following statement as the situation continues to evolve:

"New York has been and will always be a city of immigrants that welcomes newcomers with open arms. This value has made our city a beacon of freedom for people around the world and the economic and cultural powerhouse that it is. These very same humanitarian values apply to those who are ex-

periencing homelessness. In New York City, we have both a moral — and legal — obligation to house anyone who is experiencing homelessness for any reason. Currently, New York City is experiencing a marked increase in the number of asylum seekers who are arriving from Latin America and other regions. In some instances, families are arriving on buses sent by the Texas and Arizona governments, while in other cases, it appears that individuals are being sent by the federal government. In order to both meet the legal mandate as a right-to-shelter city and provide high-quality shelter and services for those who enter our system, New York City needs additional federal resources immediately. If we do not get these urgently needed resources, we may struggle to provide the proper level of support our clients deserve, while also facing challenges as we serve both a rapidly growing shelter population and new clients who are seeking asylum. We are calling on the federal government to partner with New York City as we help asylum seekers navigate this process, and to provide financial and technical resources.

"By law, asylum seekers have a right to be in the United States while they seek humanitarian protection. In New York City, we are responsible for the provision of services and infrastructure for newly arrived asylum seekers and currently residing populations alike. We've been in discussions with our federal partners on this matter and look forward to a quick resolution."

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Consumer Alert: New York State Division of Consumer Protection Offers Tips for Summer Travel

New Yorkers Should Know Their Rights and Follow Basic Tips to Avoid Travel Scams

Does Travel Insurance Really Work or Help? What You Should Know

The New York State Division of Consumer Protection (DCP) reminds New Yorkers of their rights as summer travel heats up. Travel disputes remain one of the top complaints handled by DCP. In 2021, DCP fielded hundreds of complaints from consumers who had to cancel or reschedule their travel plans due to COVID-19. As more New Yorkers are traveling again, consumers should be informed of their rights, shop smart to safeguard their hard-earned money, and stay vigilant to protect themselves from scams.

“With flight cancellations spiking and airports overcrowding, planning ahead, and being prepared is the best way to avoid travel headaches,” said Secretary of State Robert Rodriguez, who oversees the Division of Consumer Protection. “If you plan to use air travel to support your travel plans, planning for cancellations and delays and building more time in your itinerary could save you frustration and money.”

Superintendent of Financial Services Adrienne A. Harris said, “During the height of summer travel season, I urge all New Yorkers to review their travel rights and follow basic tips to avoid scams. The Department of Financial Services is collaborating with the Division of Consumer Protection (DCP) to ensure that New York travelers have accurate information as they make or amend their summer travel arrangements. The Department recommends that consumers read travel policies carefully before purchasing to fully understand what is covered if travel plans are disrupted.”

SHOPPING SMART FOR TRAVEL

There are basic travel tips that consumers should be aware of when they are booking travel:

- Plan & Expect Cancellations and Delays. Pack a change of clothes, electronic device chargers and snacks in your carry-on luggage to support travel disruptions. A cancellation that impacts your return home will require additional resources, budget for an extra day or two to sustain until you can get home.
- Book early morning tickets. You will have greater options for getting to your destination timely.
- Consider traveling to a larger airport. Larger metropolitan airports offer more direct flights than regional airports. Direct flights avoid missed connections and cancellations in a city outside of your hometown or destination.
- Do your research. Consumers should always weigh in the factors of a trip before purchase, including price, location, availability of activities and cancellation policies. Also consider whether the location has any Covid-19 restrictions in place, such as testing or vaccination status, prior to booking the trip. For a secure, digital copy of your vaccination record

and/or negative COVID test result, you can retrieve your Excelsior Pass Plus here.

- Get all confirmations in writing. To safeguard against scams via changes in agreements, consumers should always get confirmation of plans in writing whether booking online, over the phone, or in person. Retailers are required to disclose terms and conditions to consumers—always receive a copy of the agreement and save it for reference.

- Beware of “all inclusive” or too good to be true offers. All-inclusive offers sound great but can have hidden charges and fees in their terms and conditions. Consumers may not even be aware of such fees until check-out when their bill is higher than advertised. Sometimes these offers come with an agreement to join a membership or participate in a presentation. Always inquire about mandatory fees that may not appear in the advertised price, such as resort fees and taxes. Read the fine print when taking advantage of an “all-inclusive” offer.

- Evaluate the benefits of paying by your credit cards. Credit cards often offer more protection than paying by cash, check or debit card. Some credit card companies also offer perks like trip insurance or concierge service while traveling and may offer additional protections if the trip is cancelled. Check with your credit card company on the conditions of travel expenditure reimbursement.

- Review your travel agreements. The New York State Truth in Travel Act safeguards consumers against fraud, false advertising, misrepresentation, and other abuses. Travel agents and promoters must provide consumers with written disclosures of all the terms of the travel service within five days of purchase or agreement. Consumers should review the terms of the agreements fully upon receipt and ensure they align with what the consumer purchased. Consumers have until midnight of the third business day after receiving the agreement to cancel. Consumers can also cancel any time during the five-day period prior to receiving the disclosures.

- Use reputable travel agents/tour companies. Consumers should research thoroughly before choosing an agent or company to work with. Keep track of arrangements and contracts, and review terms and conditions, especially the cancellation and refund policies. Reservations often require a deposit that may not be refundable. If the trip is cancelled, the deposit might only be applied toward future travel or may be forfeited altogether. Consumers should be sure they understand the policy prior to putting down a deposit.

- Consider trip insurance and whether you need a ‘Cancel for Any Reason’ policy. Travel insurance can offer consumers relief in case of emergency before or during their trip, as coverage ranges from incidents of lost baggage to missed connections to potential medical emergencies. However, most standard travel insurance policies do not cover trip inter-

ruption or cancellation due to COVID-19 because such standard policies usually exclude coverage for an epidemic, pandemic, or similar public health event. Some trip insurance plans offer ‘Cancel for Any Reason’ coverage at an additional cost, which is often substantially higher than standard travel insurance and normally only allows up to 75 percent refund of traveler expenses if the trip is cancelled. Prior to purchasing a plan, review the terms of the policy and ask your insurer about coverage that may be excluded.

TRIP CANCELLATION

When all or part of a trip is cancelled, the cancellation policy and a consumer’s right to a refund will vary depending on the laws that regulate the company’s industry, who initiates the cancellation, when the cancellation is made, and the company’s own policy.

- According to the U.S. Department of Transportation, airlines must offer refunds, including the ticket price and any optional fees charged, for cancelled or significantly delayed flights, even when flight disruptions are outside their control. If an airline isn’t doing that, consumers should report it to the U.S. Department of Transportation. If consumers cancel a reservation for any reason, consumers will be subject to the refund policy agreed to at the time of purchase, which may be no refund at all.

- Cruise Lines. Refund options may vary by cruise line. The cruise ticket contract lays out the company’s cancellation policies and your rights. For example, you may be offered a refund, credit, or voucher for a future cruise. If you opt for a credit or voucher, make sure the expiration date is far enough out that you can use it. Read more from the Federal Maritime Commission about consumer rights and the recourse that might be available to you.

- Cancellation policies for hotels, motels, and online accommodation marketplaces can vary greatly, even within the same company based on the season, room type, or length of stay. Some may offer a choice between a refundable or nonrefundable rate while making the reservation. Be sure you fully understand the cancellation policy prior to making a reservation.

If a consumer is having trouble getting a refund owed for all or part of a cancelled trip, they are encouraged to file a complaint with DCP.

SIGNS OF A TRAVEL SCAM

The Federal Trade Commission warns against common travel scams. Some signs of a scam when booking travel include the following:

- You have “won” a free vacation. Scammers will sometimes entice consumers with a free trip, but then disclose fees or deposits to get access. A prize should not include spending money and is likely a scam.

- The details of your trip are vague. Consumers may be offered a stay in a five-star hotel or on a luxury cruise line, but then few details about the trip are

More than 80 Percent of Cancer Patients And Survivors Say Copay Assistance Programs Help Them Afford Their Prescription Drugs

Findings Highlight Need for Governor Hochul to Sign Copay Accumulator Reform Bill to Make It Easier for New Yorkers to Pay for Medically Necessary Medications

A new Survivor Views survey from the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) shows that while copay assistance programs can help cancer patients afford the medications they need, some aren’t able to apply them to their health insurance deductible or other out-of-pocket requirements, which can create a barrier to care.

An overwhelming majority of respondents (83%) who have applied to a copay assistance program and were accepted say the assistance enables them to get medication they otherwise couldn’t afford. However, more than a quarter (27%) of respondents who enrolled in a copay assistance program report that the assistance they received was not applied to their health insurance deductible or other out-of-pocket cost requirements.

Sponsored by an individual pharmaceutical manufacturer or an independent foundation, copay assistance programs are offered to people with limited incomes or who have a high medical need. However, insurers are using copay accumulator adjustment programs that prevent counting copay assistance toward an individual’s health insurance deductible or maximum out-of-pocket limit, making it harder for patients to afford medically necessary prescription drugs.

“Everyone should have a fair and just opportunity to prevent, find, treat, and survive cancer,” said Michael Davoli, Senior Government Relations Director, American Cancer Society Can-

cer Action Network (ACS CAN). “Copay accumulator adjustment programs make it more challenging for patients to afford their medication, erecting barriers to care at a time when they should be torn down.”

Legislation was passed by the New York State Legislature in May that would remove this barrier to care by requiring insurers to count all payments made by patients -- either directly or on their behalf -- toward their overall out-of-pocket maximum payment or deductible.

A.1741-A/S5299-A would protect cancer patients from delayed treatment and allow patients to realize the benefit of copay assistance programs. The passed both houses of the legislature by overwhelming margins. Currently the legislation is waiting for Governor Hochul’s signature.

The survey also found that one-fifth of all survey respondents report having skipped or delayed taking a prescribed medication due to cost, with lower income (44%), Asian and Pacific Islander (40%), Black (44%), and Hispanic (58%) patients and survivors reporting significantly higher rates of missed medication, making the need for copay accumulator reform legislation even greater.

“The evidence is clear that we need A.1741-A/S5299-A to provide relief for New York patients and make it easier, not harder, for them to afford medically necessary prescriptions,” said Davoli. “We urge Gov. Hochul to sign this critical legislation.”

The survey of 1,241 cancer patients and survivors nationwide was conducted May 16-26, 2022 with another 1,370 interviews conducted among traditionally underrepresented demographic groups to allow for in-depth statistical analysis.

neoliberal and colonial policies and in turn, climate change. Drawing from specific examples, such as the first withdrawal from the Svalbard Global Seed Vault in 2015 in response to the Syrian war—the subject of her film Wild

Relatives—Manna underscores the scientific limitations in recovering the loss of biological life, in all of its forms. Additionally, her work visualizes the slow violence of industrial agriculture while asking poignant questions about what kind of future is possible in a precarious present.

and 80 percent greater in Black mothers living in small cities and rural communities compared to their white counterparts.

With A9102 now law, a group of postpartum experts will be legally required to conduct a comprehensive study and prepare a report on the differential impacts of postpartum depression screening measures in relation to Black and brown women and birthing people.

The study will:

- Examine what additional questions or tools could be implemented to minimize disparities found within the current screening protocols.
- Identify racial disparities within existing protocols and screening measures for postpartum depression and mood disorders
- Identify ways to reduce or eliminate transgender and non-binary and racial and ethnic health care discrimination and disparities that contribute to disparities within current postpartum depression screening protocols.

presented. Always confirm and review the name of the company and location of the trip details.

- You have limited time to accept the offer. Scammers often pressure consumers to make quick decisions about a deal, making it likely that the consumer will not have time to investigate the offer. Never feel pressured to agree to any terms you have not reviewed on your own.

- You must pay in an uncommon way. Cryptocurrency, wire transfers, and gift cards are difficult to trace and perfect for scammers looking to take advantage of consumers. These

types of payments make it difficult for consumers to recoup their losses. If a travel company insists that you pay in one of these ways, decline the offer and report the company.

The New York State Division of Consumer Protection provides voluntary mediation between a consumer and a business when a consumer has been unsuccessful at reaching a resolution on their own. The Consumer Assistance Helpline 1-800-697-1220 is available Monday to Friday from 8:30am to 4:30pm, excluding State Holidays, and consumer complaints can be filed at any time at www.dos.ny.gov/consum-

erprotection.

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Overwhelming Majority of Council Members Call for Mayor Adams And Chancellor Banks to Fix School Budgeting Policies & Restore School Budgets in Letter

41 of Council's 51 members urge mayor and DOE to restore school budgets with over \$760 million in newly discovered unspent federal stimulus funds before decisions that would separate teachers from existing schools for next year

A supermajority of the New York City Council called for Mayor Eric Adams and Schools Chancellor David Banks to immediately restore individual school budgets by using more than \$700 million in newly discovered unspent federal stimulus funds at the Department of Education (DOE) from the previous fiscal year. In a letter signed by 41 of the Council's 51 members, including Speaker Adrienne Adams, they demanded urgent action from DOE to restore school budgets within the month, before schools must make decisions about teacher-hiring that would separate teachers from their current schools for the upcoming school year. The letter also calls for DOE to commit to a process with school stakeholders that changes its inefficient policies on school budgeting and the Fair Student Funding formula ahead of the next fiscal year and school year.

In the letter, the Council expresses its "opposition and disappointment with how the Department of Education is administering individual school budgets, [pointing to] DOE's return to long-standing, dysfunctional and bureaucratic policies that negatively impact schools [as] counterproductive."

The letter states: "Principals, schools, and teachers must make important decisions within the next month, and your continued inaction is hampering their ability to make the right choices for students.

The letter also high-

lights "...reports of DOE removing funding from individual schools, unrelated to the city budget is further evidence of its harmful policies." It points to discrepancies in the levels of funding being reported as cut from school budgets: "DOE has indicated a gap in school budgets of approximately \$215 million, barely 0.06% of the agency's \$37.6 billion budget. Despite differing amounts of funding being reported as cut from schools by DOE, indicating even greater reductions and the policy-driven nature of school budgets, the solution remains the same[1]. DOE's numbers are not adding up, and it seems to be using the city budget as a smokescreen to evade responsibility for its policies that undermine support for schools."

The letter cites the New York City Independent Budget Office's identification of "\$761 million in unspent federal stimulus funds for Fiscal Year 2022 and \$38.1 million from Fiscal Year 2021" that the Council demands be used to restore school budgets.

The Council passed the Fiscal Year 2023 city budget with agreement that it would invest over \$700 million more in city funds for DOE than the Fiscal Year 2022 budget. While the Preliminary Budget indicated that spending on school budgets would change based on enrollment, including increased funds for some schools and reduced funds for others, there was a lack of transparency regarding the impact on individual schools, how enrollment was being forecasted, and federal stimulus funds.

Despite DOE's assertion during the city budget process that enrollment changes to school budgets would lead to a gap of \$215 million due to a lack of federal stimulus funds, the

newly discovered unspent stimulus funds and recent reports of additional school budget cuts contradict these claims. The reality schools are facing has become clear based on individual school budgets that were released later than usual, the result of problems with the same DOE policies on school budgets that the Council is now raising and were manifested in its school funding formula being rejected in its first Panel for Educational Policy vote. The mayoral administration's refusal to acknowledge the need to resolve these DOE issues in the city budget process led the Council to announce an oversight hearing shortly before its budget vote to support resolution.

"As a DOE music educator and the proud parent of three daughters enrolled in NYC public schools, the mayor's cuts to schools affect me both as a parent and as an educator," said Paul Trust, a Brooklyn teacher and parent of children in Queens public schools. "The school where I have taught students will be losing our music program, which is an integral part of the school's culture. My daughter's school will be losing a guidance counselor and classroom teacher, leading to increases in class sizes and a decrease in the emotional care many students require. I am imploring the mayor, chancellor and DOE to restore school budgets, so our students are provided with the support and programs they desperately need."

[1] The Office of the NYC Comptroller has compared the initial Fiscal Year 2022 school allocations to the initial Fiscal Year 2023 FSF allocations and indicated a "net reduction of \$489 million between the two years." The Comptroller's Office has also stated that "1,166 schools lost a total of \$469 million."


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
