The Supreme Court Has Weakened U.S. Patents, And **Congress Must Act**

The Supreme Court has handed down momentous decisions over the past two decades on a variety of hot-button issues. But some of the most consequential rulings -- for our physical well-being, our economic vitality, and even our national security -- have flown under the radar.

For years, the justices have steadily chipped away at longstanding intellectual property rights. By doing so, they've unintentionally stymied investment into critical industries, from medical diagnostics to artificial intelligence, that will determine our health, wealth, and security for much of the 21st century.

Take, for instance, Mayo Collaborative Services v. Prometheus Laboratories. Prometheus Labs had sued the Mayo Clinic for violating a patent on a diagnostic test for gastrointestinal disease. The Supreme Court ruled in 2012 that the Mayo Clinic had, in fact, infringed Prometheus' patent -- but also ruled that the Prometheus technology was ineligible for patenting because it measured a naturally occurring process, even though the test itself was clearly novel.

Mayo caused investors to reduce their funding for U.S. medical diagnostics companies by billions of dollars in the years following the Court's ruling. That drop helps explain

why European biotech companies were producing and cheaply distributing reliable at-home Covid tests during the first year of the pandemic, while Americans were stuck waiting for days for PCR tests that had to be sent to centralized labs. In Europe, diagnostic tests remain patentable.

Other decisions, such as Bilski v. Kappos (2010), Association for Molecular Pathology v. Myriad Genetics (2013), and Alice Corp. v. CLS Bank International (2014), have raised similar uncertainty around patents. Inventors wondered: Are our creations patenteligible, and if they are, will the patent count for anything?

When inventors cannot capitalize on their inventions, they cannot recruit investors, and transformative ideas cease coming to market. That's especially true in the life sciences industry.

It can take billions of dollars and many years to produce medical breakthroughs -- breakthroughs protected by patents that can be licensed or sold. Yet absent robust patent protection, potential life sciences investors can't expect a return, and in that case, they take their investment dollars elsewhere.

Fortunately, Congress seems to recognize the damage these Supreme Court rulings have wrought -- and lawmakers are now poised to correct the justices' mistakes.

To restore strength to America's patent system and promote innovation, Congress is contemplating reforms to Section 101 of U.S. patent law, which governs what sort of products and processes are eligible for patent protection. The proposed legislation, spearheaded by Senators Chris Coons (D-DE) and Thom Tillis (R-NC), eliminates the uncertainty created by the Supreme Court decisions. The bill replaces Mayo and other rulings with new and clearer guidelines.

Crucially, the bill also aligns the U.S. patent system with international standards, enabling American inventors to compete on a level playing field. In a world where the competition for innovative technologies is everincreasing, the United States can't afford to fall farther behind.

The bill also levels the playing field for inventors and small businesses, enabling them to compete with larger corporations that have more resources to navigate and manipulate the current patent system.

Americans' health, economic prosperity, and even national security depend on regaining an edge over rival nations in critical fields. Supreme Court rulings have derailed our technological leadership. Senators Coons' and Tillis' legislation will help put us back on track.

in the "White alone" category, with 10.9 million people.

On a state level, California has more people who indicated that they are "Irish alone or in any combination" in the "White alone or any other combination" category with 3.3 million. New York followed with 2.5 million, followed by Pennsylvania with 2.2 million, Texas with 2.1 million, and Florida with 2.1 million.

In the "Irish alone" section of the "White alone" category, California (803k) and New York (730k) still come out on top, but Florida moves into third place with 692k people who indicated that they are Irish, followed by

Texas (669k) and Pennsylvania (601k).

"These 2020 Census data illuminate the rich diversity across our nation," said Rachel Marks, chief of the Census Bureau's Racial Statistics Branch. "We have this comprehensive picture thanks to the millions of people who responded to the census and provided their detailed racial, ethnic, or tribal identity, and thanks to the stakeholders, researchers, and tribal leaders who helped us improve how we collect these detailed data."

On the county level, Cook County in Illinois has the most people who said that they were "Irish alone or in any other combination" with 567k. It's followed by

Los Angeles County in California (545k), Maricopa County in Arizona (514k), Middlesex County in Massachusetts (357k), and San Diego County in California (356k).

In the "Irish alone" section of the "White alone" category, Cook County remains on top with 150k, Maricopa County moves into second with 140k, followed by Los Angeles County with 123k, Middlesex County with 121k, and Norfolk County in Massachusetts rounding out the top five with 88k.

Elsewhere, 5,181 people indicated that they were "Northern Irelander" in the "White alone or in any other combination" category, and 1,611 said they were Northern Irelander in the "White alone" category.

Attorney General James, FTC, And Multistate Coalition Sue Amazon For Illegally Maintaining Monopoly Power

Lawsuit Details How Amazon Wields Its Monopoly Power to Inflate Prices, Degrade Quality, and Stifle Innovation for Consumers and Businesses

New York Attorney General Letitia James, leading a bipartisan multistate coalition of 17 attorneys general, joined the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) in suing Amazon, alleging that the online retail and technology company is a monopolist that uses a set of interlocking anticompetitive and unfair strategies to illegally maintain its monopoly power. The lawsuit alleges that Amazon's actions allow it to stop rivals and sellers from lowering prices, degrade quality for shoppers, overcharge sellers, stifle innovation, and prevent rivals from fairly competing against Amazon.

The complaint alleges that Amazon violates the law not because it is big, but because it engages in a course of exclusionary conduct that prevents current competitors from growing and new competitors from emerging. By stifling competition on price, product

selection, and quality, and by preventing its current or future rivals from attracting a critical mass of shoppers and sellers, Amazon ensures that no current or future rival can threaten its dominance. Amazon's far-reaching schemes impact hundreds of billions of dollars in retail sales every year, touch hundreds of thousands of products sold by businesses big and small, and affect over a hundred million shoppers.

"Amazon illegally raised prices for consumers and took advantage of online sellers in its storefront and they should be held accountable," said Attorney General James. "Amazon's monopolistic behavior is hurting consumers, online sellers, competition, and the overall economy. Today my office is leading a multistate coalition in joining the FTC to put an end to Amazon's abusive and manipulative practices to protect consumers and small businesses nationwide. Every company, big or small, must abide by the law and my office is not afraid to hold those that don't to account."

The coalition alleges that Ama-

zon's anticompetitive conduct occurs in two markets — the online superstore market that serves shoppers and the market for online marketplace services purchased by sellers. These tactics include:

Anti-discounting measures that punish sellers and deter other online retailers from offering prices lower than Amazon, keeping prices higher for products across the internet. For example, if Amazon discovers that a seller is offering lower-priced goods elsewhere, Amazon can bury discounting sellers so far down in Amazon's search results that they become effectively invisible. • Conditioning sellers' ability to obtain "Prime" eligibility for their products — a virtual necessity for doing business on Amazon — on sellers using Amazon's costly fulfillment service, which has made it substantially more expensive for sellers on Amazon to also offer their products on other platforms. This unlawful coercion has limited competitors' ability to effectively compete against

NYC Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs Releases Report on The City's Immigrant Population And Initiatives of The Office in 2022

NYC Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs (MOIA) Commissioner Manuel Castro released a report on the city's immigrant population and initiatives of the office.

The report highlights the impact of MOIA and showcases the work done by the Adams administration to respond to the challenges that many new immigrant and long-time immigrant New Yorkers faced during calendar year 2022.

"Amidst a global humanitarian crisis that has led to tens of thousands of people seeking refuge in New York City, the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs has, time and again, stepped up to the challenge by helping guide policy related to our newest New Yorkers and provide critical core services such as language access and individualized referrals," said Anne Williams-Isom, Deputy Mayor of Health and Human Services. "This report provides a snapshot of that work and recognizes the team at MOIA that gets stuff done every day for immigrant families and individuals, whether they just arrived to seek asylum or came to call NYC home through another path. Thank you to Commissioner Castro and his dedicated team for their work to serve immigrant communities all across the city."

"As someone who immigrated to this country as a child with my mother, and grew up in New York City, I understand the critical work of this office and its importance," said Manuel Castro, Commissioner of the Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs. "Under the leadership of Mayor Eric Adams, and Deputy Mayor Anne Williams-Isom, the city mobilized a colossal humanitarian operation to support our newest New Yorkers. No other city in the nation has responded to this scale. The outpouring of compassion and support from New Yorkers at the Port Authority Bus Terminal, modern-day Ellis Island, has been truly inspiring. This report highlights our efforts in responding to a global humanitarian crisis while continuing to serve longtime immigrant New Yorkers."

In 2022, the Adams administration responded to multiple global humanitarian crises. From the Russian war on Ukraine to the influx of asylum seekers crossing the US/Mexico border, many immigrants came to New York City seeking refuge and a chance at the American Dream. This report

reviews the critical role MOIA played in developing initiatives to support our newest New Yorkers while continuing to serve long-time immigrant New Yorkers.

Some of these initiatives include creating the City's first Ukrainian Response Initiative and continuing to serve Haitian New Yorkers through our Haitian Response Initiative. The MOIA team also engaged with 10,643 immigrant New Yorkers through our Ask-MOIA hotline, delivered 1,536 translations of over 300 different source documents in 49 different languages. Through MOIA's Immigrant hotline, we fielded nearly 40,133 calls conducted over 11,467 comprehensive legal screenings through the city funded immigration providers. Our English Language Learning team hosted 74 courses, reaching over 4,578 English language learners, and trained 146 volunteers online.

MTA to Provide Shuttle Bus to Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Queens

Shuttle will Operate Once an Hour Between Mets-Willets Point Subway Station and Flushing Meadows Corona Park Memorial is Free and Open to the Public

The Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) has announced that it would provide a shuttle bus between the Mets-Willets Point subway station and the NYC Department of Veterans' Services Vietnam War Memorial, which will be in Flushing Meadows Corona Park from Thursday, Sept. 28 through Sunday, Oct. 1.

Between Thursday, Sept. 28 and Saturday, Sept. 30, the shuttle will operate every 60 minutes between 8:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m. On Sunday, Oct. 1, the shuttle will operate every 60 minutes between 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. The shuttle will make stops at Roosevelt Av between Union St and Main St, Roosevelt Av in front of the Mets-Willets Point subway station, and Flushing Meadows Corona Park.

"Every day, buses help more than one million New Yorkers get to work, school, and everything the city has to offer," said New York City Transit Senior Vice President of Buses Frank Annicaro. "We are proud to work with the Department of Veterans' Services to ensure everyone can visit the memorial to pay their respects to the millions of Americans who served in the Vietnam War."

"We are excited to partner with the MTA while The Wall That Heals is on display in Flushing Meadows Corona Park," said NYC Department of Veterans' Services Commissioner James Hendon. "The addition of shuttle buses not only provides a convenient option for New Yorkers to pay their respects, it also makes The Wall That Heals accessible to an even wider audience."

"New Yorkers have a great chance to reflect on our history and pay tribute to our veterans who made the ultimate sacrifice when the Wall That Heals opens next week," said New York State Senator John Liu, Member of the Senate Transportation Committee. "Many thanks to the MTA for making sure this special exhibit is accessible to all New Yorkers with bus service between Mets-Willets Point and the memorial in Flushing Meadows Corona Park."

nization in New York State and is located in Jackson Heights, focusing on issues like workers' rights, immigrant and civil rights, and environmental and housing justice. La Jornada, a food pantry in Woodside, helps to provide basic services to address the needs

of the immigrant and low-income communities in Oueens.

The money, which includes \$1.6 million for Make the Road and \$250,000 for La Jornada, will help provide equipment and

Federal Regulations Now in Effect Allow Consumers to Buy Hearing Aids Over the Counter

The New York Department of State's Division of Consumer Protection and Division of Licensing Services have released guidance to help consumers navigate the process of purchasing hearing aids. In 2022, new federal regulations went into effect allowing retailers to sell hearing aids over the counter. This means consumers with mild to moderate hearing loss can now buy hearing aids in store or online without needing a prescription or formal hearing test. "As over-the-counter hearing aids become more readily available on store shelves, making them more affordable and accessible, it's important for consumers to understand that shopping for these devices may not be as simple as it seems," said Secretary of State Robert J. Rodriguez. "There are many factors to consider while choosing between over-the-counter and traditional prescription hearing aids, and I urge New Yorkers who are in the process of purchasing hearing aids to read our guidance to help decide which option can best serve their needs.'

New York State Office for the Aging Director Greg Olsen said, "Over-the-counter hearing aids are an option newly available for many consumers struggling with mild to moderate hearing loss. As with any major purchase - especially one that may be necessary to support quality of life – it's important to make an informed decision that suits your specific needs and expectations when it comes to fittings, maintenance, and other factors. The State's Division of Consumer Protection has provided an exceptional resource to help, and I encourage all who are considering a hearing aid to read this new guidance."

Professionally Fitted Hearing Aids vs Over-the-Counter Hearing Aids: What's the Difference? Hearing Test:

- Over the counter: You will not receive a hearing test when you buy over-the-counter hearing aids.
- Professionally fitted: A registered professional will test your hearing and help you pick a product that meets your needs. They will also refer you to a specialist if your hearing tests reveal a condition that is medically treatable.

Choosing a Hearing Aid:

• Over the counter: You will tion's website.

need to pick the product yourself and do your research to make sure the device you pick can meet your needs. Over-the counter hearing aids are generally the least expensive option available. (Note: These hearing aids are intended for people with mild to moderate hearing loss and not severe hearing loss.)

• Professionally fitted: A registered professional will discuss your specific hearing needs to help you pick a hearing aid that is most appropriate for you and your budget. A registered professional can help you find the right hearing aid for any level of hearing loss, including severe or profound hearing loss. Hearing Aid Fittings:

• Over the counter: You are responsible for ensuring a proper fit and professional assistance is not provided.

• Professionally fitted: A registered professional will program the device to your unique hearing needs. They will also make sure the device is comfortable and properly fits. The provider will work with you to make sure you are able to correctly use the device on your own.

Returns and Warranties:

- Over the counter: Check the product return and refund policies before you buy. You may not be able to return or get a refund on an over-the-counter hearing aid purchase. Over-the-counter hearing aids are not required to provide a warranty.

Con Edison Says Region is Warming Quickly as Climate Change Impacts Accelerate

Update to 2019 Research Predicts Faster Increase of Extreme Hot Temperatures

Temperatures in the New York City region are rising quickly due to climate change, meaning Con Edison must accelerate its investments to keep electric service reliable and resilient for customers, according to Con Edison's 2023 Climate Change Vulnerability Study.

The findings have significant implications for Con Edison's electric delivery system because heat and humidity drive up customers' air conditioning needs, placing a strain on the company's equipment.

By 2030, New York City will experience up to 17 days a year with temperatures of 95 degrees or higher, the study projects, up from four days a year historically. New Yorkers will experience up to 27 such days by 2040 and up to 32 such days by 2050, according to the study.

"This most recent study provides alarming evidence that climate change will affect the lives of New Yorkers sooner and more severely than had previously thought," said Tim Cawley, the chairman and chief executive of Con Edison. "That's why Con Edison is thinking more boldly about ways to strengthen the reliability of our electric delivery system. We are ushering in new sources of renewable energy and making sure that every New Yorker can share in the benefits of a more sustainable grid."

"This study shows Con Edison's commitment to staying abreast of the latest climate science and to relying on leading experts," said Michael Gerrard, professor at Columbia University Law School and director of the Sabin Center for Climate Change Law. "The company is taking a leading role among energy companies in making investments to ensure continued reliable service in the face of escalating climate change."

Con Edison's latest study uses climate change projections developed by Columbia University and the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority. The study, which Con Edison produced with support from ICF International, updates the projections in the company's first-of-its-kind 2019 study.

Con Edison filed the study with the New York State Public Service Commission today. The company later this year will file a report on the measures it will have to take to protect its equipment and customers in New York City and Westchester County from the rising temperatures and other climate change impacts.

While the 2019 study predicted a dramatic increase in the number of hot days, the new study accelerates the predicted timetable by a decade.

The first study forecast that by 2030 there would be 11 days a year when the temperature in Central Park exceeds 95 degrees, increasing to 18 days by 2040 and 23 days a decade later.

Climate change, which the new study calls "an existential and multi-faceted threat around the world," will affect Con Edison customers and equipment in other ways, the company said.

- The risk of flooding, which can damage underground electric delivery equipment, will increase, as sea levels rise 16 inches by 2050 and New York experiences five days a year with precipitation exceeding 2 inches. The historical norm is three days per year.
- The annual maximum wind speed in New York City could reach 60 miles per hour in 10 to 15 years, compared to about 50 miles per hour on a historical basis. Strong winds can knock trees and branches onto overhead delivery equipment, causing customers to lose power.
- The risk of ice forming on overhead power lines and trees will increase. That impact can cause outages.
- Hurricanes could be more intense and more likely to track toward the Northeast.

In addition, Nor'easters and cold snaps could be less frequent, but more intense when they do occur. Torrential downpours could be more frequent and intense.

Climate change is likely to drive stronger and more frequent storms in the New York City region, bringing heavier rainfall and coastal storm surge. Hurricane Ida in 2021 brought more than seven inches of rainfall in Central Park and resulted in flooding across the city.

Hurricane Sandy, the worst storm in New York City's recorded history, caused floodwaters to overrun underground electric delivery equipment, knocking out power on the East Side of Manhattan from 40th Street south and on the West Side from 30th Street south

But the most striking change in the latest Con Edison study is in the predictions about heat. The urban heat island effect adds to the challenge of extreme heat in New York City. The rooftops and pavement that characterize city landscapes retain heat, meaning higher temperatures, particularly at night.

The higher night-time temperatures result in air conditioners working harder to cool homes and businesses. That means the underground delivery equipment does not cool off as much overnight during heat waves.

Higher temperatures can decrease the capacity of cable, substation transformers and other equipment, meaning Con Edison has to invest to replace that lost capacity. The heat can also cause the demand for power to exceed the system's capacity.

Con Edison recognizes that disadvantaged communities have fewer alternatives during outages, meaning they suffer greater effects from flooding and heat. Con Edison will consider how climate change affects these areas and incorporate that consideration into its reliability and resiliency investment plans.

The company has been fortifying its vast electric delivery system for years, but climate change is prompting the company to accelerate the planning and execution of upgrades.

The company invested \$1 billion in its energy systems over four years following Sandy. After two March 2018 storms caused severe damage, the company invested another \$100 million in Westchester County. The company's analysis shows the investments since Sandy have prevented more than a million customer outages.

While investing to fortify its infrastructure, the company is leading the region's transition to a clean energy future. Con Edison works with customers to help them complete rooftop solar projects, adopt heat pumps and reduce their usage through efficiency.

The company makes clear in its Clean Energy Commitment that it supports the environmental goals of New York City and State and is building a grid to carry 100 percent clean energy by 2040.

Just in 2023, Con Edison has announced the completion of an important transmission project in Queens, enabling the retirement of an inefficient fossil fuel plant, and the start of construction of a Clean Energy Hub in Brooklyn. Both these projects will carry offshore wind power that the state is adding to its portfolio.

Amazon's illegal, exclusionary conduct makes it impossible for competitors to gain a foothold. With its amassed power across both the online superstore market and online marketplace services market, Amazon extracts enormous monopoly rents from everyone within its reach. This includes:

• Degrading the customer ex-

perience by replacing relevant, organic search results with paid advertisements — and deliberately increasing junk ads that worsen search quality and frustrate both shoppers seeking products and sellers who are promised a return on their advertising purchase.

- Favoring Amazon's search results to preference Amazon's own products over ones that Amazon knows are of better quality.
- Charging costly fees on the hundreds of thousands of sell-

ers that currently have no choice but to rely on Amazon to stay in business. These fees range from a monthly fee sellers must pay for each item sold, to advertising fees that have become virtually necessary for sellers to do business. Combined, all of these fees force many sellers to pay close to 50 percent of their total revenues to Amazon. These fees harm not only sellers but also shoppers,

Federal Dollars Secured in the Inflation Reduction Act Will Help Create Green Jobs, Plant New Trees, and Maximize Green Spaces In Historically Disadvantaged Communities, Including Jackson Heights, Elmhurst, Corona, and Neighborhoods Throughout the Bronx

U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand held a press conference at the Central Park Arsenal announcing \$20 million in federal funding to plant and maintain trees, combat extreme heat and climate change, and expand access to green spaces in NYC. I'm so proud to deliver this \$20 million investment in Inflation Reduction Act funding, which will help combat extreme heat, create equitable access to green spaces, improve air quality, and better the overall quality of life in this great city," said Senator Gillibrand. "This money will help bring new life for New Yorkers to enjoy a greener, healthier environment."

"Thank you to the Biden Administration and our congressional delegation for providing critical funding for our city's trees, some of the hardest working trees in the nation," says Deputy Mayor for Operations Meera Joshi. Council Member Won Designates \$12,550,000 For District 26 Parks, Including \$7.15 Million For Lou Lodati

On Friday, September 22, Council Member Julie Won celebrated \$12,550,000 in capital funding for District 26 parks at a funding announcement at Lou Lodati/Torsney Playground. In Fiscal Year '24, Council Member Won secured a commitment of \$7.15 million for improvements to the park, including \$6 million to reconstruct Lou Lodati's playground area and \$1.15 million to expand and reconstruct the park's dog run. In Fiscal Year '23, the Council Member secured a total of \$6.96 million for improvements to Lou Lodati, including \$5.5 million to reconstruct the multipurpose playground area, \$850,000 for the handball courts, and \$610,000 for drainage and electrical utilities.

This fiscal year, the Council Member also allocated \$3,400,000 in capital funding for Windmuller Park's Swimming Pool and \$2,000,000 to repair a sinkhole at Queensbridge Park Playground. In Fiscal Year '23, the Council Member secured \$13,247,000 in capital funding for improvements to Big Bush Athletic Field, Windmuller Playground, and Murray Park Athletic Field and Dog Run.

At the announcement, Council Member Won was joined by the Sunnyside United Dog Society (SUDS) to celebrate the \$7.15 million in funding for Lou Lodati. SUDS was formed in 2001 and is made up of Sunnyside residents who frequent the park. The group advocated for the park and the dog run, which opened in 2013.

"This fiscal year, I allocated \$12,550,000 in capital funding for




our local parks to ensure that our neighbors have access to green space and up-to-date facilities at our parks," said Council Member Julie Won. "Thanks to our community's advocacy, our office secured capital funding for muchneeded improvements at three parks in our district, including \$7.15 million for the playground and dog run at Lou Lodati. Thank you to the Parks Department and our neighbors for ensuring that we are keeping our green spaces modern, safe, and beautiful for our community."

"The Sunnyside United Dog Society has been taking care of, and advocating for, Lodati Park for over 20 years. When we were pushing for the dog run in the mid-2000s we made sure to advocate for funding to improve the entire park," said Rick Duro,

SUDS. "The SUDS community works really hard on a daily basis in taking care of the dog run and garden around it, and the run was voted one of the best in the city. People come from all over the city to our dog run because it is safe, clean, and people are actively participating in their dogs' experiences there. As hard as we work, there are some things we cannot take care of, for example, the surface cracking. Huge thank vou to Councilwoman Won and her staff for meeting with us to figure out how we could get the run resurfaced. We hope that the contractor that eventually wins the bid for the project does a better job than the last one, as it started to crack within weeks of it opening in 2013. The SUDS community is very excited about this next chapter in the history of Lodati Park."


Scholar And Peace Activist Mohammed S. Dajani Daoudi Recognized at Queens College

Council Members Won & Brewer Hold Joint Oversight Hearing on City Contracting For Asylum Seekers

Council Member Julie Won, Chair of the Committee on Contracts, and Council Member Gale Brewer, Chair of the Committee on Oversight and Investigations, held a joint oversight hearing at City Hall called "Revisiting City Contracts Serving Asylum Seekers in New York City." At the hearing, the Chairs, Council Members, and the general public questioned representatives from several city agencies — the Department of Social Services (DSS), the Department of Housing Preservation and Development (HPD), New York City Emergency Management Department (NYCEM), New York City Health + Hospitals (H+H), and the Mayor's Office of Contract Services (MOCS)—to bring transparency to the City's emergency contracting process used for migrants and asylum seekers.

With Mayor Adams forecasting an anticipated \$12 billion cost burden to the city due to the asylum seeker crisis, the Council is focused on understanding how the administration is spending those funds. While the administrative responsibilities for managing this crisis fall on several city agencies, the direct services for asylum seekers are provided by a complex network



of for-profit and nonprofit private vendors and their sub-vendors. These vendors are mainly being contracted through emergency procurement, which absolves the administration from having to abide by traditional procurement rules, and thus necessitates greater scrutiny to ensure that public dollars are not wasted.

The Council's Oversight and Investigations Division (OID) reviewed and analyzed contracts and publicly available spending data related to the asylum-seeker crisis to better understand and map out the network of non-profit service providers, agencies, and for-profit companies receiving public dollars and how those dollars are being spent. Findings include:

- Of the 196 contracts that OID examined that were related to asylum seeker spending, only 3 were procured through competitive bidding.
- The 125 of the City's emergency-procured contracts represent nearly \$2 billion of contract value.
- Many of the vendors contracted

through emergency procurement are not M/WBEs.

- Nearly 40% of vendors providing asylum-seeker services had also provided services during the COVID emergency.
- The Hotel Association of New York's (HANYC Inc.) \$237 million dollar contract already one of the City's largest for the asylum seeker crisis has an amended contract amount of \$1.365 billion, making it the City's largest asylum seeker contract and over three times the total amount of DocGo's \$432 million dollar contract.

"Only 1.5% of City Contracts for asylum-seekers were awarded through the typical competitive bidding process," said Council Member Won. "This means that nearly all asylum-seeker contracts

were emergency procurements, which allows vendors to be hired without adequate due diligence, in a no-bid process that all but guarantees that City taxpayers will be overcharged. Without necessary guardrails around these contracts over the last 18 months, we have observed major lapses in accountability from many vendors—from inflating costs, to overpromising capacity, and even misrepresenting services being provided. The City should immediately limit these emergency procurement practices and return to standard competitive bidding for our most predictable costs, such as shelter providers, food, and case workers. As we brace ourselves for a series of painful budget cuts, the City must award contracts based on a procurement process that will lower costs, provide transparency,

and hold negligent or fraudulent vendors accountable."

"The city has awarded no-bid contracts to an array of for-profit vendors with virtually no oversight to provide asylum seekers with housing, food, and other services," said Council Member Gale A. Brewer. "At a time when the Administration has called for stark budget cuts across city agencies to pay for asylum seeker expenses, I don't understand why we're spending so much money on private companies that are obligated to their shareholders and not to the people of New York City. The Administration is already renewing emergency contracts into 2026 which lets them skip competitive bidding for a second time. At what point is this crisis no longer an emergency from a procurement perspective?

"I am beyond thrilled to complete the second phase of the Sunset Cove project, completely revitalizing a space that was for years inaccessible to the community," said NYC Parks Commissioner Sue Donoghue. "With restored natural areas, a new boardwalk. and an outdoor classroom for the children of this community to explore the natural world, this project truly strikes to the core of our work at Parks, which is to further enrich the lives of New Yorkers through environmental stewardship."

"This use of reclaimed Rockaway Boardwalk wood in the construction of this wonderful recreation space at Sunset Cove is symbolic of Broad Channel's

remarkable recovery from Hurricane Sandy and of the fact this neighborhood and all of Queens are being built back better than they ever were before," said Queens Borough President Donovan Richards Jr. "Thanks to this project, residents and visitors will be able to easily enjoy the beautiful Sunset Cove wetland area and all of its spectacular sunsets. I'm very proud the Queens Borough President's Office joined our partners in government in funding this critically important project."

"Sunset Cove is magnificent! This revitalization is what happens when community partners come together. Thank you to NYC Parks's Elizabeth Jordan and Broad Channel's own Dan Mundry Jr. The new Sunset Cove brings this neighborhood to a whole new level and I can't wait to see benefits the boardwalk and outdoor classroom bring to our community," said Assemblywoman Stacey Pheffer Amato.

"It's great to see this space be revitalized and turned into a true asset for the community," said Councilwoman Joann Ariola. "This is an amazing project that will bring enormous benefits to Broad Channel for years to come."

The second of two phases of work, the recently completed project has constructed an 8-foot-wide boardwalk adjacent to the newly restored wetlands at Sunset Cove

Park. The boardwalk was partially constructed using reclaimed wood from the Rockaway Boardwalk destroyed by Hurricane Sandy in 2012, and leads to a covered outdoor classroom that has interpretive elements, including inset seasonal sun position information and binoculars. A new bioswale has also been built at the park entrance to collect storm water.

Phase one of the project, previously completed in June 2019, restored 4.5 acres of salt marsh and 7 acres of maritime upland in the park to improve habitat, enhance public waterfront access, and reduce wave and wind impacts during storms.

The \$4.2 million phase two project was funded through a New York Rising grant, with additional support from the Office of the Queens Borough President, State Senator Joseph Addabbo, Jr., and then-Assemblymember Phil Goldfeder, with continued support from Assemblywoman Stacey Pheffer Amato.

The recently released Mayor's Management Report shows that the administration's focus on public safety, public space, and people continues to pay off. In FY23, NYC Parks completed 141 capital projects, exceeding the target of 125, with 88 percent of project construction completed on time or early and 91 percent within budget, also surpassing targets.

who pay increased prices for thousands of products sold on or off Amazon.

Attorney General James, FTC, and the multistate coalition are seeking a permanent injunction in federal court that would prohibit Amazon from engaging in its unlawful conduct and pry loose Amazon's monopolistic control to restore competition.

Joining Attorney General James and the FTC's complaint are the attorneys general of Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Jersey, New Hampshire, New Mexico, Nevada, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Wisconsin.

For New York, this matter was handled by Assistant Attorneys General Michael Jo, Tal Elmatad, and James Yoon, under the supervision of Deputy Bureau Chief Amy McFarlane and Bureau Chief Elinor Hoffmann — all of the Antitrust Bureau. The Antitrust Bureau is a part of the Division for Economic Justice, which is overseen by Chief Deputy Attorney General Chris D'Angelo and First Deputy Attorney General Jennifer Levy.

"New York Restoration Project is thrilled that trees are getting the critical investment that they deserve," said Lynn Bodnar Kelly, Executive Director of New York Restoration Project. "As we know from our work on the groundbreaking MillionTreesNYC initiative, trees are New Yorkers' natural allies in mitigating heat, sequestering excess carbon, and absorbing excess rainwater in the face of the climate crisis. We applaud Senator Gillibrand's leadership in bringing game-changing funds to bolster New York's urban forest."

The Bronx is Blooming is honored to receive this \$5 million grant from the USDA Forest Service. This unprecedented investment will engage thousands of

local students, Bronx youth, and diverse community partners in tree planting and stewardship, equipping them with the tools to grow and support our urban canopy," said Jenn Beaugrand, Founder and Executive Director of The Bronx is Blooming. "We are incredibly excited about the opportunities this grant will create for our community to come together to give Bronx green spaces the love and care they deserve."

On average, temperatures in urban forests are 2.9 degrees lower than in un-forested urban areas. Across New York City, over 7 million people, or nearly 80% of New Yorkers, are affected by elevated temperatures. The Inflation Reduction Act included historic investments to flight climate change, including funding to create equitable access to green spaces across New York. Urban forests help cool our neighborhoods, protect New Yorkers from dangerous heat waves, and improve air quality, health and mental health outcomes, and overall quality of life. The Inflation Reduction Act included \$1.5 billion over the next 10 years for the U.S. Forest Service's Urban and Community Forestry program.

The federal funding an-

nounced today will be distributed between the NYC Department of Parks and Recreation and The Bronx is Blooming. The projects financed by the funding are described below.

NYC Department of Parks and Recreation: The first project will establish a green job training and employment program, providing a pathway into forest restoration careers for underserved communities. The second project includes growing the urban forest through planting trees and preserving existing trees. It promotes community engagement through outreach, education, and empowerment. The project also offers paid training and employment opportunities for youth and adults, focusing on workforce development and green jobs.

The Bronx is Blooming: This project engages K-12 students in environmental education and tree stewardship, provides green jobs and forestry training for local youth, and brings new trees to Bronx neighborhoods. It addresses longstanding environmental and health inequities related to air quality, excessive heat, and park access, while creating economic opportunities in disadvantaged communities.






